The EMCDDA

- Decentralised technical EU agency
- The EU's central reference point on drugs information (since 1995)
- Network of National Focal Points
- Provide the Community and EU Member States with factual, objective, reliable and comparable information at European level concerning drugs and drug addiction and their consequences

Definitions ...

Evaluation =

The making of a judgement about the amount, number, or value of something; an assessment.







Definitions ...

"an evidence-based <u>judgement</u> as to <u>what extent</u> and <u>how well</u> a policy, strategy or intervention has been implemented and/or what <u>effect</u> it has had."

PolicyEvaluation



Can also assess other things e.g. why a policy or programme did or did not work



Important points

- Drug policy comes in many forms
- Evaluation should be natural - to do the best you can, not a threat
- Evaluation also comes in many shapes and sizes









Why evaluate?

Evaluation is essential for effective policymaking:

- to improve planning of policy & services
- for efficient resource allocation
- it promotes organisational learning
- for transparency and accountability.



What should you evaluate?

- Overall policy or strategy
 OR individual programme/elements
 General evaluation
 OR targeted evaluation
- Or a mixed approach?



Choice will depend on: resources, time, data, how evaluation will be used






Evaluating drug policy

The call for a common approach to the drugs phenomenon in Europe was first made by the European Parliament in the mid 1980s. In response, heads of state and government of the 12 Member States of the European Community agreed on the first European plan in the field of drugs 1990.

Two years later, the plan was revised and a new European plan in the field of drugs 1992 was adopted by the European Committee to Combat Drugs -CELAD, a newly created intergovernmental mechanism among Member

Evaluation is essential for effective policymaking, helping ensure that policies and programmes have the desired effect, provide value for money and do not have negative unintended consequences. The importance of evaluation has been recognised in all EU drug strategies and in the strategies of many Member States.

Key messages
