


EU DRUG STRATEGY (2013-20) AND ACTION PLAN (2017-20): PROBLEMS

- Implementation
 - Serves as a blueprint for national drug strategies
 - No binding legal power
 - No accountability for member states no consequences
 - No EU budget
- Evaluation
 - Process evaluation but not really impact evaluation
 - Lack of measurable indicators (especially supply reduction)
 - If there are, they are not used
- Preparation
 - Evaluation findings are not taken into consideration
 - Civil society involvement is not sufficient lack of transparency

1. NO MEASURABLE REDUCTION IN DEMAND AND SUPPLY

- The illicit drug market is larger than ever
- Drugs prices are stable, accessibility is easier
- MDMA has returned presursors are replaced
- Cocaine market is rising
- No supply reduction but supply replacement NPS
- The market has diversified deepweb markets new technologies
- And at what price? huge increase in the criminalisation of young people


- Spanish study: 88% of cannabis contains human poo
- Quarz in cannabis: can lead to silicosis and severe lung damage
- VICE video: German dealer claims 90% of weed is contaminated with synthetic cannabinoids
- Synthetic cannabinoids: severe dependence, OD deaths

3. GOING AFTER THE BIG FISHES?

- Since 2018 at least 18 banks received prosecution agreements for moneylaundering crimes
- At least 4 went on and committed the same crime and got fined again – no prosecution
- 2012: George Osborne, UK's chancellor of the exchequer: if the banks are closed the economy will suffer





4. SCALING DOWN HARM REDUCTION SERVICES?


- Many MS are well bellow the WHO's target of 200 needles/IDU/year
- Several countries scaled down harm reduction: Hungary, Serbia, Romania, Bulgaria, Slovakia, Poland
- Funding is scarce severe disruptions
- No innovation in harm reduction



5. QUALITY DRUG PREVENTION AND TREATMENT?







- Outdated approach: frontal lectures – no interactions
- Message: just say no
- Most drug prevention programs are run by the police
- No quality control in prevention and treatment

6. POVERTY, HOMELESSNESS AND RACISM

- Are we having a drug problem or a poverty problem?
- The so called "problem drug users" are not the problem – but the inhumane conditions in which they live
- Ethnic minorities, migrants and other marginalised groups are excluded from health/social care
- Racial profiling exists in Europe too
- Roma people in the East: nobody addresses the problem



7. CANNABIS REGULATION: ELEPHANT IN THE ROOM



- City level initiatives to regulate cannabis
- Dutch government's initiative to grow legal cannabis
- Spain's cannabis social clubs
- Luxembourg: first country to legalise cannabis?
- Even North Macedonia is considering legal regulation

BUT HOW SHALL WE REGULATE THE MARKET?

TIME TO CHANGE THE PARADIGM

- "If all you have is a hammer everything will look like a nail." – taking out drug policy from a security framework – to a social-health framework
- COVID lesson learnt: the need for a strong common EU health policy
- We need to think outside the box: explore alternatives of current repressive drug policies
- Black-and-white fallacy of free market legalisation vs. total prohibition should be avoided: we have so many regulatory options between the two extremes
- Local level = innovation Let cities, countries experiment!
